**The Prayer of the Day:** Almighty God, you have built your Church on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone. Join us together in unity of spirit by their teaching, that we may become a holy temple, acceptable to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

*The First Reading:*     **Exodus 20:1-4, 7-9, 12-20** Then God spoke all these words: <sup>2</sup>I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; <sup>3</sup>you shall have no other gods before me. <sup>4</sup>You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. <sup>7</sup>You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name. <sup>8</sup>Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. <sup>9</sup>Six days you shall labor and do all your work<sup>12</sup> Honour your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving you. <sup>13</sup>You shall not murder. <sup>14</sup>You shall not commit adultery. <sup>15</sup>You shall not steal. <sup>16</sup>You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour. <sup>17</sup>You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour. <sup>18</sup>When all the people witnessed the thunder and lightning, the sound of the trumpet, and the mountain smoking, they were afraid and trembled and stood at a distance, <sup>19</sup>and said to Moses, "You speak to us, and we will listen; but do not let God speak to us, or we will die." <sup>20</sup>Moses said to the people, "Do not be afraid; for God has come only to test you and to put the fear of him upon you so that you do not sin."

*Second Reading:*     **Philippians 3:4b-14** If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: <sup>5</sup>circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; <sup>6</sup>as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. <sup>7</sup>Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. <sup>8</sup>More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ <sup>9</sup>and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. <sup>10</sup>I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, <sup>11</sup>if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. <sup>12</sup>Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make

it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. <sup>13</sup> Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, <sup>14</sup> I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

*The Gospel:* **Matthew 21:33-46** <sup>33</sup> "Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. <sup>34</sup> When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. <sup>35</sup> But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. <sup>36</sup> Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. <sup>37</sup> Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' <sup>38</sup> But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance.' <sup>39</sup> So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. <sup>40</sup> Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" <sup>41</sup> They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time." <sup>42</sup> Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'? <sup>43</sup> Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. <sup>44</sup> The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls." <sup>45</sup> When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. <sup>46</sup> They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

SOLUTIONS for AFRICAN DEVELOPMENT (COSAD)

This organisation was founded by Tanzanian-born Smart Baitani. Smart grew up in Bukoba, Tanzania and attended the local school. Somehow he made his way to the US and earned an MBA. For several years he worked as a banker in Minneapolis, then last year, in his late 30's, he left banking and dedicated his life to helping improve the standard of living in his birth place. For his Master's project Smart founded the organisation COSAD and under its umbrella he has embarked on numerous projects to help relieve the desperate poverty of his people. This summer, St Barnabas parishioners, **Peter and Francesca Davenport** were privileged to travel with Smart and work in two areas of his country: Bukoba--a regional capital and Izigo--a rural area.

In Bukoba we worked in the school, teaching a little and creating a library. This is the school Smart attended as a boy. It has no electricity or plumbing and the children study in shifts, 60 children to a class sitting four to a desk. They have few books and materials.

In Izigo area we became involved with OWOOG--one woman one goat--soon to be renamed OPOG (one person----) after Francesca objected to the discrimination! Unlike many of the goat-donation projects we see heavily advertised, this plan is well thought out. Since goats need large quantities of water in order to produce milk, some projects simply increase the work load for the already overburdened women and children who have to add several hours labour per day to collect water. We worked on a rain collection system in the village. No goats were given until Smart had set up markets for the produce--the local orphanage will buy all the milk and cheese produced. Goat owners will thus be able to increase their income from \$1 to \$5 per day. In time they will have a secure income stream which will enable them to apply for micro loans given by COSAD. Unfortunately, loans given by the local banks, not being based on an assured income stream, usually result in repossession of the pitifully sparse houses owned by the villagers.

This is just a small introduction to the projects undertaken by COSAD, most of which are undertaken in conjunction with the Bukoba church choir's outreach programme. This part of the world has been devastated by AIDS which swept down from Uganda at the time of the war with that country in Idi Amin's reign. The lady to whom we gave the first goat is raising her five grandchildren. She has lost her husband and nine children to AIDS. She lives in a mud house which has no glass in the windows, electricity or water and which is smaller, darker and less equipped than most of our garages.

Peter and Francesca would like to start a fund to help the villagers of Izigo. We shall be presenting more information from time to time and would be glad if any other parishioners would like to participate in this project.
