Annual Meeting of Parishioners Minutes
Sunday, February 9, 2025 at 12:00 AM

The Annual General Meeting of Parishioners of St. Barnabas Anglican Church was called to order at 12:00 p.m. by the Reverend Kersi Bird. There were 68 parishioners in attendance.

Opening Prayer

The Rev. Kersi Bird opened the meeting with a prayer.

Faithfully Departed

Rev. Kersi read into the record the parishioners of St. Barnabas Anglican Parish that had passed in 2024.

Appointment of a Recording Secretary for the Annual Meeting of Parishioners

Angie Martinac was appointed as Recording Secretary of the 2025 Annual Meeting.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of February 11, 2024

Moved by Jill Stroud, seconded by Sheila Jervis that the minutes of the February 11, 2024 meeting be approved. There were no omissions or edits.

Incumbent's Report

Rev Kersi thanked all for the ministry shared.

The Reports

All other reports outlining the activities of the Parish were presented and no questions were asked. Moved by Janet Sims, seconded by Bert Standring that the reports be received.

2024 Financial Statements

Balance Sheet

We had \$69,000 in our chequing account at the end of the year. We will be getting a \$3,812 GST credit, we get 50% of all GST paid back. Summer camp was paid for out of I.E. Roberts trust. We automatically get 5% of the rectory reserve but have applied for 10% due to the amount the account. Investments are through RBC Wealth Management.

Income Statement

We received a \$5,000 bequest and have two years' investment income listed due to timing of when they were received. Investment income goes into general operations. Salaries are up due to health care costs going up last year, but we were only notified in February so they were not budgeted for. Urdu service has had some small expenses, but they bring in more money to the church to offset this. Some items budgeted under the Capital Expenses have been paid out of maintenance/repairs because they were small expenses such as paint. Several small funds have been combined into Mission & Outreach which is why that has more money.

2024 Budget

We budgeted a 3% cost of living increase. Parish Events is when we hold something like a supper and collect donations. We should see a 5% Investment Income according to Diocese. Churchill Park is now paying for their own utilities, which is why their rent is lower than last year. Salaries increased to bring them in line with Diocese. Professional fees are paid out of Christian Education fund. Insurance costs are expected to go up by 10%.

Alongside Hope Report

St Barnabas had two Fundraising campaigns for Alongside Hope (formerly PWRDF) in 2025.

The first was during Lent. We initially raised funds for Reforestation at home and abroad, to improve food security. However, when USAID to needy areas was abruptly cut before Easter, we re-directed our funds raised to an Emergency Resilience fund set up by Alongside Hope to relieve places who depended on the USAID. We sent \$2,220 to Alongside Hope at this time.

The second campaign was during Advent, in November and December. At this time we directed our fundraising to rural Columbia, where \$120 helps a woman maintain her beehives. She harvests and sells the honey, and the bees pollinate nearby crops of fruit and food. Our goal was to help 10 women (\$1,200). We raised a total of \$2,455, far surpassing our goal.

Envelope Secretary's Report

In memory of Jutta Hinrichs

First, I would like to posthumously acknowledge the very valuable contribution made by Jutta Hinrichs to this Ministry. Her dedication, computer literacy and attention to detail was much appreciated. We worked together jointly every week since September 2023 right up to the day before her sudden death in July 2025.

2025 Summary

By year end, the church database of contributing congregants included 194 households. Of these, approximately 1/3 are using electronic donation methods (PAD, Tithely or E-transfer), 1/3 pay by cheque and the remaining 1/3 give cash.

Pledges for 2025 were received from 63 households following the 2025 Stewardship Campaign. The total amount pledged for 2025 increased significantly from 2024.

- Generic white envelopes are available in the Narthex or in the pews. Please make sure that your name and/or envelope number are on the envelope containing your donation. Special service envelopes are made available at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas.
- It would be appreciated if general congregation collection donations are kept separate from clearly marked specific donations for the Rector's Discretionary

Fund, altar flowers, fundraising events, special services, memorials, bequests etc.

- New in 2025 are Gift-In-Kind forms for use if expenses are being gifted to the church rather than invoiced for reimbursements. Both blank forms are available for use in the Narthex.
- Please note that only one tax receipt is being issued for 2025.
- An ever-growing number of parishioners have already transitioned to monthly or quarterly donations which has helped to simplify the process.

I want to thank all those who donated snacks and supplies. The cost of a 900g can of Maxwell House coffee has increased from \$8 to about \$20 in the last year. Fortunately, two families have donated all the coffee needed throughout the year.

I will finish my term as coffee-time host coordinator on Feb 8, the day of our Annual Meeting of parishioners. My thanks to the hosts for their contribution to this ministry. Many of you have become close friends and I look forward to our Christian journey together.

I am indebted to Rev. Kersi and Rev. Marcus for their leadership and encouragement. It was a pleasure to serve.

St. Barnabas Community Garden Report

We have a St. Barnabas Community Garden at the south end of the Church that has thrived for both the community at large and individual gardeners. We currently have 18 raised beds utilized by individual parishioners, and community members, and 26 working gardeners. We also have communal portions of the garden that include fruit trees, plum, pear and three varieties of apples, raspberries, and a variety of herbs and flowers.

The gardeners are requested to maintain the communal areas in addition to their own plots. We also help each other by watering other gardens if requested. This was a very successful season for gardeners but a little unusual. We had enough rain in May and June and then a whole month of July with lots of rain, so we only used about a week of the Church's water. Usually June is our 'monsoon month' but this year it was July.

We had a bumper crop of apples, pears and plums this year. Most gardeners had very successful gardens. As we cannot donate any produce to HSCA as directed by the Alberta Health Services, some individual gardeners took the opportunity to donate to some parishioners.

We had 'working days' where gardeners were invited to come to participate in community tasks which required more than one gardener such as distributing mulch and setting up rain barrels. These working days and/or evenings are followed by some social time where gardeners brought their own chairs and refreshments and sat in the garden area and exchanged ideas and stories.

The major improvement this year was renewing the painting of numbers on the plots, new lock for the gardening shed and thoroughly cleaning out the rain barrels.

We are thankful to have a very dedicated Gardening Committee, a group of committed gardeners to utilize the plots. All of our plots were utilized this year.
